

UK's Laurie Lawrence recognized with prestigious American Society of Animal Science Fellow award

Laurie Lawrence, PhD., professor in the department of animal and food sciences at the University of Kentucky was recently awarded the American Society of Animal Science Fellow Award, which recognizes career achievements in research.

Since joining UK in 1992 Lawrence has made many significant contributions to the field of equine nutrition. She has studied the equine athlete, the brood mare, and the growing horse.

Lawrence was one of the first equine nutritionists to focus on performance horses. She and her graduate students used



Pre-exercise feeding practices vary widely in the racing industry. Lawrence's studies shed new light in this area. She found little evidence to support that the type of feeding practice (fed vs fasting) prior to high intensity exercise had any effect on the exercise response. Her studies also demonstrated that several nutrients affect immunological enhancement, including vitamin E, selenium, fructo-oligosaccharides, and omega-3 and omega-6 fatty acids.

Through cooperative efforts with U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Research Service, Lawrence has developed a major research effort involving the utilization of pastures and conserved forages by horses.



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Lawrence's research is revealing the effects of seasonal variations on pasture nutrient composition and the factors that influence pasture intake by horses. She and her students have developed innovative methods for assessing the grazing preferences of horses which she has combined with new laboratory methods of estimating forage digestibility in horses. Her work in this area resulted in her receiving the Alfalfa Public Service Award from the Kentucky Forage and Grassland Council.

In 1998, she was recognized by her peers in ASAS by being given the AFIA Award for Distinguished Research in Nonruminant Nutrition. This was the first time that a woman has received this award and only the second time that an equine nutritionist has been so honored. She served as president of the Equine Nutrition and Physiology Society and in 1999 received its distinguished service award. In 2008, she received the first ASAS Equine Science Award.

In 2004, Lawrence was appointed to chair the National Research Council's subcommittee to revise the "nutrient requirements of horses." This was the first time a women chaired a nutrient requirement series publications in the history of the NRC. The publication, released in 2007, and other NRC publications are used by nutritionists in academia and in the feed industry worldwide, and are considered to be the best source of nutrient requirement information.

Lawrence is an active member of ASAS and has served on the Board of Directors of the Society, serving as recording secretary. She has also served as Chairperson of the Nonruminant Nutrition Committee and the Horse Committee of the Society and currently serves on the Editorial Board of the Journal of Animal Science.

Her active basic and applied research programs have resulted in 75 refereed journal publications, 12 book chapters, and more than 150 scientific abstracts, research reports, and popular articles.

4-H and Youth

No Lazy Summer for Kentucky 4-Hers

The term "lazy summer" might apply to some, but not anyone involved with the Kentucky 4-H Horse Program. Summertime is when the youth in Kentucky get to show off their horse skills, and these skills abound. The 4-Her's displayed their talents in the State Judging Competition, the State Horse Contest, the State Horse Show, and the Southern Regional 4-H Horse Championships, where the Kentucky participants managed to place in every knowledge event entered. June kicked off the state competitions with the Horse Judging Contest. This event was held on June 2 at the Kentucky Horse Park and had 120 participants from all across the state. The 4-Her's judged eight classes of horses, including halter and performance classes and then gave oral reasons to our official judges. Awards were given out to the top individuals and teams in halter, performance, reasons and overall.

The following week, Kentucky horse kids gathered again in Lexington for the State Contest. This was held at the Clarion Hotel with more than 250 participants. The contest included competitions in art, sewing, photography and equipment, as well as knowledge categories such as public speaking, presentations, Horse Bowl and Hippology. Horse Bowl is a Jeopardy-like game where teams of contestants must answer a variety of horse related questions. Hippology is the ultimate horse knowledge competition that consists of a written exam, hands-on stations and horse judging.

The State Horse Show once again took place at the Kentucky Fair and Expo Center from July 2-9. In 2011 there were more than 650 participants with more than 700 horses. This eight-day event encompasses a wide range of horse disciplines including Hunter, Miniature, Saddleseat, Walking/Racking/Mountain, Contest (speed events), Western and Drill Team.

But the fun didn't stop at the State level. The Southern Regional 4-H Horse Championships were held in Tunica, Miss., on July 26-31. Southern Regionals bring participants from 13 Southeastern states. The top two teams or individuals in each knowledge category at the State Horse Contest were invited to compete at Southern Regionals for a total of 30 participants representing Kentucky in both educational events and the horse show.

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In Mississippi, the Kentucky contingent did not disappoint with top 10 finishes for both individual and teams in judging, public speaking, presentations, Horse Bowl and Hippology including second place finishes overall in Hippology and Horse Bowl.

The next stop for the contest kids is the Quarter Horse Congress in Columbus, Ohio. This event occurs in the middle of October and the Kentucky youth are already preparing for it. This will be their first national contest of the year, followed in November with the Eastern National 4-H Round-up. Eastern Nationals are held every year in Louisville during the North American International Livestock Expo.

The 4-H Horse Program has had a busy, yet rewarding summer. After all of the accomplishments at the State and Regional level, the Kentucky youth are excited to put their skills to the test against competition from across the nation this fall. Check back after nationals to see how our teams did!

Internships

UK graduate shows current student the ropes of the Thoroughbred industry

Like other interns before him, Kyle Johnson, a sophomore majoring in Equine Science and Management from Beverly, Mass., took an internship that would help him learn the ropes of the Thoroughbred industry. What made his internship different from the others is that he got to learn from a recent UK graduate.

Johnson's interned at Swifty Farms, Inc. in Seymour, Ind., where he learned what goes into managing a breeding farm.

"This experience was very insightful. I learned how a breeding session is conducted, how to give medications, and how to prep yearlings," Johnson said.



Johnson's internship supervisor, farm manager Christina Lawton, graduated from the UK's College of Agriculture in 2010 with an Equine Science and Management degree.

"My manager really showed me all spectrums of the business during my internship at UK. I learned so many things that have helped me thus far in my career, and I tried to teach my intern the same things I was taught," Lawton said.

Johnson chose to intern at Swifty Farms because he had no previous experience in the Thoroughbred industry, though he had worked on various farms growing up, and Swifty Farms was small enough to take him on but still big enough for him to learn.

Lawton said that she thoroughly enjoyed having Johnson around this summer.

"Having an intern gave me a great hand on the farm and was also a way to spread the word in Kentucky what our farm is like. Having an intern also helps us attract students to our farm for a career after college. We are always trying to find good horsemen and it is hard not being in horse country," she said.

Johnson hopes to one day run his own Thoroughbred breeding operation and said his internship helped him develop the skills he needs to be successful.

"The most important thing I learned on this internship was how vital experience is to a horseman.

There is so much that is learned from just daily work with the horses that can't be learned any other way," Johnson said.

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Lawton said Swifty Farms is always willing to take on interns and thinks that internships are very important to students.

"It was definitely a sign of our program's growth to have a recent UK graduate take an intern," said Elizabeth LaBonty, Internship Coordinator. "Christina knew the program because she had been through it and I think she was able to offer Kyle a unique perspective because of that."

"The best advice I can give is to meet everyone. Put yourself out there. Build good relationships with people in the industry so when you begin your career you have contacts to answer questions you have. My relationships I made in college saved me when I entered the real world," Lawton said.
