

I am from Paducah, Kentucky.

How did you first become involved in the horse industry?

I first started riding horses in 1996 after my older brother passed away from Neuroblastoma, a childhood cancer. I remember the exact day I asked to take riding lessons—I was in first grade at St. Mary Elementary and it was Derby Day. We had a stick horse race across the gymnasium and were given a flyer for horse lessons. The rest is history!

What were your career goals before graduation?

After graduation I wasn't exactly sure what I wanted to do. Luckily, I had the internship at USEF and was able to see how the membership-type organizations are run. I then went on to positions at the United States Dressage Federation and, most recently, the American Association of Equine Practitioners.

What led you to this position?

I was very, very lucky during my undergraduate career because of the Equine Communications Internship I did through UK Ag Equine Programs. I learned so much from Elizabeth James, Jenny Evans and Holly Wiemers during my 18-month internship. I know without a doubt these women helped me realize my strengths and develop a plan for the future. Prior to the internship, I wasn't sure how to connect my love of horses with my passion skillset in communications, marketing and event planning. I had no idea of what I wanted to do or how to get there. They are a huge part of why I am where I am now.

Where are you currently employed?

I am currently employed full-time by eLink Design, Inc. as their Project Manager and I recently started my own business, Smith Equine Media, LLC.

What are your current job responsibilities?

UK Places More Graduates in Prestigious Darley Flying Start Program Than Any Other Program in the Country

There have been a total of 11 UK graduates accepted into this program, a crème de le crème list that includes Kate (Benner) Hardy, Connor Foley, Natalie Heitz, Jackson Buchanon, Madison Scott, Kyle Wilson, Billy Ajello, Johne Jesse, Leif Aaron, Hallie Hardy and Jimmy Unwala.

"The UK Equine Science and Management program prepares students for Darley Flying Start in a way that no other program in the country can," said Jackson Buchanon, alum and current trainee in Darley Flying Start. "Not only do the staff foster a culture committed to learning in the classroom, they also encourage students and help them get real, hands-on horsemanship experience with some of the largest global equine operations in the world. This approach of knowledge from the classroom coupled with horsemanship from the farm and track makes any UK student more prepared for the rigors of Darley Flying Start and their future careers."

Darley Flying Start is a management and leadership training program that specializes in the international Thoroughbred racing and breeding industry. According to Darley's stated mission, its duty is to recruit the most talented people world—wide and to give them professional training and an experience unmatched by any other, in turn achieving Darley Flying Start's vision of producing committed industry leaders working in existing and emerging markets contributing to the long-term success of the Thoroughbred industry.

"I'm so proud of the students who have worked hard to get into this program," Elizabeth James, Lecturer and Internship Coordinator, said. "The most common traits I have noticed among these students is that they all have a strong work ethic, positive attitude and are eager to learn. Our students who have gotten into Darley Flying Start have all been as confident as they are humble; it is an admirable combination."

According to the Darley Flying Start website, the program is a two-year, full-time international management and leadership training course for the Thoroughbred industry. It was founded in 2003 by Sheikh Mohammed bin Rashid al Maktoum of Dubai. A total of 12 candidates are selected annually to receive the scholarship, which includes course fees, accommodation, transport, health insurance and a monthly allowance. Those individuals will spend time in Ireland, the United Kingdom, United States, Australia and Dubai. Darley Flying Start is accredited by the University College Dublin Michael Smurfit Business School as a graduate certificate in management (Thoroughbred industry). Other accrediting bodies include the University of Arizona (Racing Officials Accreditation Program) and Kentucky Horseshoeing School.

When Lephart and her husband, Scott, decided to move to Lexington with his position as the Dean of the College of Health Sciences, she was immediately interested in learning more about the equine programs. While Lephart's background has previously been with orthopedic research and sports medicine, she has always had a strong desire and interest to work with horses and research.

Lephart came to the University of Kentucky Ag Equine Programs in October as the research coordinator. Her responsibilities within the program are to provide leadership support to further develop and implement the UK Ag Equine Programs' new strategic plan and its emerging initiatives. She also provides community outreach and engages in sponsorship support and fundraising for infrastructure and facilities.

Lephart said she feels very fortunate that things worked out for her position within the equine programs at UK and she is now able to pursue this long-time interest.

"I have always loved horses and the environment, but working with experts who have been immersed in the industry every day is a real education and this is so invigorating," Lephart said. "It is also rewarding to be able to share my perspectives from my diverse background with them, and to open up potentially new areas of exploration to further grow the program moving forward."

In her spare time, Lephart enjoys taking riding lessons at Champagne Run and would like to focus on fox hunting and owning her own horse in the future. She also enjoys spending time with her dogs. Lephart and her husband have two Welsh Springer Spaniels, Inde and Boogie Woogie. Lephart enjoys doing therapy work with Inde and hopes to get Boogie Woogie certified soon.

"I've seen the incredible work that animals do in the way of helping people heal emotionally, physiologically, spiritually and mentally and it is not only remarkable but also very real," Lephart said.

Gluck Internship Sparks a Passion for Parasites

Jamie Norris, a senior at UK, did not have much of a background with horses. Growing up in the suburbs of Roswell, Georgia, did not give him much opportunity to interact with horses. Family friends had a farm with horses, however, so occasionally he would trail ride. This helped to peak his interest in animals and the natural world in general.

"[I] fixed computers for a long time before deciding that it was boring and that I wanted to work with something a little closer to nature," Norris said when describing how he ended up at UK.

Through his time at UK, Norris, now an animal science major with an equine specialty, said he has become fascinated by something most people squirm at, equine parasites. When considering his internship opportunities, an chance to work at the Gluck Equine Research Center was "too enticing to pass up."

He is also considering a career in parasitology, so working with Martin Nielsen, professor and researcher, at the Gluck Center was the perfect fit.

"When I decided to pursue an internship there, Dr. Nielsen proposed that I put together a research project in an attempt to answer a few of the nearly endless list of questions that I had come up with while working there," Norris said. "Specifically, I was to answer some questions about equine tapeworm eggs which we both agreed needed to be addressed."

At the end of the internship, he presented his findings to the researchers within the Gluck parasitology lab.

Norris said working at Gluck only confirmed that parasitology research is just as interesting as he hoped it would be.

"I loved watching Jamie progress through this internship," said Elizabeth James, lecturer and internship coordinator. "He's such an outstanding student anyway, but the more he worked with Dr. Nielsen, the more his passion about parasites - yes parasites! - grew. In the meantime, though, he has developed into quite the researcher."

Norris' passion about parasites and how much he has really enjoyed his time spent on his research project is evident to anyone who talks with him. He described his favorite part of his research, tapeworm detection as follows.

"The difficulty, and subsequent euphoria, of detecting tapeworm eggs in fecal samples," he said.

Norris credited his internship with showing him what a research position was really like, giving him a lot of resources and connections for the future and helping him grow as a person.

"I walked away from this internship with more confidence in a laboratory setting as well as having made numerous connections with people. I was introduced to new research techniques and was able to practice public speaking - something which I consider a weak point in myself," he said.

He said he also appreciated that everyone at Gluck was very supportive and helped contribute to his interests.

"[They] were incredibly helpful and were always glad to answer questions and foster my interest in scientific research," Norris said.

"Jamie was a wonderful presence in the lab, and had a true knack for research," Nielsen said. "He is reliable, dependable and hard working. He helps others with no hesitation. I quickly noticed that Jamie has a genuine interest for research and possesses an ability to think about scientific problems in alternative ways."

Nielsen also mentioned that Norris' internship furthered his education and career opportunities.

"He recently wrote an abstract for a scientific conference which has been accepted into the program. All in all, Jamie has largely exceeded expectations for his internship and I am pretty certain that the experience gathered here will become very valuable for him in his future endeavors," Nielsen said.

Once he graduates from UK, Norris said he plans to apply to the Gluck Center's graduate program, as well as some programs abroad, and continue pursuing a career in parasitology research. He hopes one day to reside in Northern Europe.



Scott County Field Day An Educational Opportunity for All

On Friday, July 15, Old Friends Farm in Georgetown generously hosted a field day for Scott County, where residents in the area could visit and enjoy the farm, while learning about agriculture and interacting with extension services and local businesses. The event was organized by the Scott County Extension Office.

Tractors and other types of farm equipment were on display for participants, and several were used in demonstrations so attendees could understand their proper uses. Krista Lea, research analyst and coordinator of the UK Horse Pasture Evaluation Program, and Ray Smith, professor within UK's Plant and Soil Science Department, gave talks on proper pasture management, such as correct seeding and care of pastures, as well as types of weeds and herbicides, and how to treat weeds appropriately and responsibly with the herbicides.

Among the local businesses and associations that attended were the Kentucky Equine Education Project, Scott County Farm Bureau, Central Kentucky Veterinary Center, UK Extension Services, Pratt's Lawn and Landscape, UK Ag Equine Programs and plant and soil sciences. Farm owners, city dwellers and equine enthusiasts alike browsed the different booths, and almost all attended the talks given by Smith and Lea. Many people were fascinated by the hay and grass samples brought by the Plant and Soil Science Department, and were excited to learn information on choosing good hay and correct types of grass for their lawns or pastures.

People who visited the UK Ag Equine Programs' table were very interested to find out about the *Bluegrass Equine Digest*, as well as the broad opportunities offered by the Equine Science and Management program at UK. Attendees seemed to enjoy being able to discuss things with the rest of the associations and small businesses as well, and were happy to listen and take in all the information each booth supplied, whether it was given verbally or through a publication. Every person who attended seemed to enjoy their time at the Scott County Field Day, and hopefully everyone left with new information they could use.


Gluck Equine Research Center Welcomes Taylor Pence


