

UK Student Shannon Frame Finds Her Passion at the Racetrack

Shannon Frame of Ballston Lake, N has spent the last two summers working in Nick Zito's barn at Saratoga Racecourse in New York. Zito is currently in the top 25 Thoroughbred trainers based on earnings a year and in 2005 was inducted into the National Racing Museum Hall of Fame. There, as a hotwalker, Frame fell in love with War Pass, who at the time was an un-raced 2-year-old. After his first race, Frame was fortunate enough to be there and hotwalk him as a winner.

When she found out that he would

run in the Breeder's Cup World Championships in October of this year, she knew she couldn't miss him. Frame, along with a couple of her like-minded friends made the 13-hour road trip from Lexington to see him run. After War Pass won the Breeder's Cup Juvenile, leading from start to finish, she was able to once again be his hotwalker.

Shannon is an Animal Science Major with an emphasis in Equine Science. As a junior here at UK, she is involved in numerous activities, one as the 2006-2007 UK Horse Racing Club President. As president she helped to plan and host the club's recent panel discussion of Thoroughbred trainers. "Inside Horse Racing: The Trainer's View" was held Oct. 8. This fundraiser was a huge success, with more than \$4,000 made to benefit both the Horse Racing Club and the Maker's Mark Secretariat Center.

Horses have always been a constant in Frame's life. She said "No matter what has changed, I have always known that I wanted a career in Thoroughbred racing." Her future career plans include spending her remaining summers working for Zito. Upon graduation she plans to pursue two Thoroughbred internships -- the Irish National Stud and Darley Flying Start. After completing these internships, Frame would like to return to the track with a vast array of knowledge in the Thoroughbred industry and take that knowledge to work her way from assistant trainer to starting and running her own training stable.
