Learning: A Two-Way Street

Most people enter into the horse world because they hold a great admiration for the power and beauty of the horse. They want to learn how to work with a horse to accomplish a goal, whether it's driving four horses in-hand through the cross country course at the Alltech FEI World Equestrian Games, going on a simple trail ride or learning how to fix and heal ailments and injuries that happen to horses along the way. Learning as much as we can about the anatomy and physiology, the mechanics of movement and the nature/ behavior of horses gives us more knowledge to handle, train and understand what our horses need to be able to perform at their best. However, you might have noticed the way most of this formal or informal learning occurs, comes from a human-centered perspectiveand is mostly one-way learning. In very simplistic and general terms, the following learning equation exists:

Human teaches horse -->horse learns from human ->better performance of horse

What if, in working with horses, you also held a horse-centered perspective? To become

curious about a perspective that includes the question "How can I learn about who I am from the horse?"

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New Equation:

Horse teaches/assists human -> human learns about themselves and develops and grows -> better performing humans (and incidentily increased collaboration with horses)

The world of Equine Assisted Learning (EAL) is a growing field of study that focuses on how horses can assist humans in learning about themselves as humans. Over the past two decades, there has been explosive growth worldwide in the emerging EAL industry. In the United States alone there are more than 700 centers that provide some type of equine assisted learning program and four internationally recognized associations that teach, support and certify their members in collaborating with horses for healing and human growth and learning purposes. UK women's polo team wins nationals

The University of Kentucky women's polo team topped three other teams at the United States Polo Association National Intercollegiate Championships April 5 through 10 in Charlottesville, Va., to capture its first national title. Additionally, one of UK's horses was named best polo pony in the men's division, and UK's polo string earned designation as overall best polo string in the men's division.

Only four years old, the upstart team was an unlikely victor. Having fallen short in its run to a spot at the national championship with a loss at the March regional competition, the UK women's team earned a second chance to compete at the national competition due to its performance during the regular season. And then the team won. And won again. First was California Polytechnic State University. UK came out on top 20 to 6. Next, UK took on top-seeded Cornell and came out ahead 18 to 12. In the finals, UK played against Texas A&M and won by one point, with a final score of 15-14.

"I am so unbelievably proud. I went to Charlottesville with two others who were competing on the team and we were in tears," said Tannis Marley, co-founder and past president of the team. "I just thought it would be a fun thing to do when I went to college, and now we're national champions. I'm just so proud of all the hard work and dedication and support this team has had over the years."

The team is coached by Jorge Vasquez, manager of the Lexington Polo Club. The championship team included riders Courtney Asdourian, a sophomore majoring in history and Spanish; Cary Campbell, team president and junior majoring in family studies; Posey Obrecht, a freshman majoring in equine

science and management; and Meghan Shader, a sophomore also majoring in equine science and management. Asdourian was also named to the All-Star Team.

"I'm so excited. To see where we were four years ago and now where we are," Marley said. "I had so many people coming up to me at the event wanting to come to UK just to play polo. We already have nine recruits coming next year. It's just amazing."



(ctd. from page one) At the Center for Leadership Development in the College of Agriculture, we offer workshops for students, as well as organizations, where participants have a chance to learn leadership competencies from a horse that are transferable into any work or personal situation. Some of the competencies and skills that horses can teach us are:

- Self-awareness and awareness of others how to employ the hyper and acute perceptual awareness that a horse utilizes 24/7
- Effective body language and communication skills
- Consistency
- Integrity alignment of thought, emotion and action
- How to notice and utilize feedback
- Confidence

A person's leadership style and personality show up in exercises involving simple observation and leading of a horse to moving a horse in the roundpen. Just remember that those who are entering the horse industry and those who have been in it for a lifetime have an amazing resource for personal growth. It is the relationship between the people and their horse(s). Remember, as you move forward in equine studies, ask the question, "What can the horse teach me?"
